

The Potential of FSPs

We know FSPs have the potential for immense impact, but providers lack the tools necessary to fully realize this potential.

February 2023- Commission approved first biennial FSP report (2022) to the legislature as **mandated through SB 465**. Report identified data quality, mandatory minimum funding levels, and insufficient technical assistance as key issues. Commission identifies FSPs as key priority.



May 2024- Commission hears from consumers, county behavioral health staff, and FSP providers on key opportunities and challenges to improve FSPs statewide.



February 2024- The Commission **authorizes a set-aside of \$20 million** of Mental Health Wellness Act funding to strengthen Full-Service Partnerships and asks staff to present a specific funding proposal at a future meeting



May 2024- Commission hears from colleagues at DHCS, and partners at HBGI and Third Sector on extensive learning efforts on ways to improve FSPs.



August 2024 - The Commission approves the allocation of \$10 million in Mental Health Wellness Act funds to support the capacity building and technical assistance efforts as specified in the FSP Funding Proposal.



March 2025- Commission approves its second biennial FSP report (2024) to the legislature which includes recommendations for investing in capacity building and technical assistance around performance management.



May 2025: FSP Request for Proposals presented to the Commission for approval for release



RFP Specifications:

Technical Assistance and Capacity Building in Performance Management



Minimum Qualifications:

5+ yrs TA to service providers in public behavioral health

2+ years TA in the public behavioral health system in California.



3yr contract, 8+ counties, 20+ FSP providers statewide.



Establishes provider learning collaborative and workgroup for performance metrics.



Development of training tools so today's investment provides evergreen benefits to all FSPs across California.



Strict accountability to the Commission demonstrating provider gains in skills and knowledge.



Proposed Motion:

• That the Commission authorizes staff to release an RFP to award \$10 million in Mental Health Wellness Act funding through a competitive bid process designed to coordinate the recruitment, technical assistance, and training for county behavioral health departments and FSP service providers to build internal capacity in performance management.
