Berkeley	Encampment Based Mobile Wellness Center	4/28/2022	\$ 2,802,400.00	BMH proposes to utilize a mobilized wellness center to visit various homeless encampment locations in order to provide and bring customized services, resources, and linkages to meet individuals where they are. BMH will select and work closely with a Community Based Organization with extensive knowledge of the local unhoused community and will also be knowledgeable in all areas of service provision described below.
Butte	REST at Everhart Village	4/28/2022	\$ 3,510,520.00	Resilience Empowerment Support Team (REST) will be comprised of a team adapted from the Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) model, to provide outreach, engagement, referrals and appropriate linkages and services for individuals who are homeless and have not been able to engage in behavioral health services. Through REST, the County will build a collective framework to promote engagement in services by offering a “menu of services and support” including an emergency shelter of tiny house style sleeping cabins embedded within Everhart Village and supportive services and care coordination provided through partnerships with community-based organizations.

Marin	Student Wellness Ambassador Program (SWAP): A County -Wide Equity Focused Approach	9/23/2021	\$ 1,648,000.00	Marin County requested up to \$1,648,000 of Innovation spending authority to support students during critical transition points and throughout their high school years by creating a centralized, county-wide, collaborative approach to peer wellness programming called the Student Wellness Ambassador Program.

Modoc	Integrated Health Care for Individuals with Severe Mental Illness	5/25/2022	\$ 480,000.00	The project seeks to prevent or reduce negative health impacts of metabolic syndrome in individuals receiving specialty mental health services and who are prescribed antipsychotic medication. The County proposes to implement and evaluate an integrated approach to healthcare utilizing metabolic screening and various interventions coordinated through partnerships with Modoc's Public Health Department, Modoc Medical Center, and Sunrays peer-ran wellness center.
Monterey	Residential Care Facility Incubator	11/1/2021	\$ 792,130.00	Monterey County requested authorization for the one-time time use of up to \$792,130 of Innovation funding to complete phase one of a two-phased Innovation project which seeks to increase the availability of culturally competent housing for individuals living with serious mental illness.
Orange	Community Program Planning Request	5/25/2022	\$ 950,000.00	The County proposes to use these funds towards the following activities to meaningfully engage their partners in proposal development and feedback throughout the duration of the project: Innovation staff time to research concepts, develop materials, and coordinate meetings; Translation and Interpretation services to support County's diverse community; Consultants and Subject Matter Experts to assist in facilitating meetings; Marketing Strategies to reach the broader community; Program supplies (stipends, transportation costs for partners to attend meetings, cost of printing and discussion materials, etc.)

The County would like to expand their efforts to reflect the diversity of their community while ensuring inclusivity of both unserved and underserved communities. This process requires continuous quality improvement at the county level, and in order to bring those ideas to fruition, the county is proposing to hire a consultant to design, develop and implement a more robust, streamlined and revitalized community planning process.
