CERI is an Oakland-based nonprofit with the mission to cultivate healing, advocacy, and empowerment of refugee and immigrant communities affected by war, torture, genocide, and other life-altering traumas.

Founded in 2006 by Dr. Mona Afary, an Iranian immigrant and women's rights advocate, alongside Cambodian genocide survivors and community leaders.



MISSION





CERI is a community sanctuary for refugees and immigrants, serving over 1,200 people each year from diverse communities, including: Cambodian, Afghan, Burmese, Vietnamese, Tibetan, Nepali, Eritrean, and Iranian.

Staff speak 25+ languages in addition to English. 90% identify as refugees or immigrants, or children of refugees or immigrants.

Staff are not outsiders delivering services
—they are trusted community members.

About one-third of our 37-member team have been participants in our programs.

They carry their own histories of displacement and resilience, and they know the languages, the values, and the cultural traditions of our clients.



DEPORTATION DEFENSE







Participant reaction: "This event helped me see how forgiveness can play a major role in emotional and mental healing. Hearing stories about refugees being pardoned made me understand that carrying guilt, trauma, or fear can deeply affect mental health and that being forgiven can bring relief, peace, and a sense of belonging."





UN GLOBAL CITIZEN AWARD

CERI received the United Nations Global Citizen Award at the Bay Area's U.N. Day Celebration this October, themed "Beyond Borders: Uplifting and Protecting Immigrants and Refugees." To be recognized alongside Senator Alex Padilla, ACLU Northern California, Alameda Health System Refugee Clinic, and Soccer Without Borders was profoundly meaningful.
