




The problem we are trying to solve in Butte County:





We are currently treating 19 percent (111 of 576), of the severely mentally ill homeless population in the County.

Individual barriers

- Stigma
- Symptoms/functional impairments
- Addiction
- Situational (transportation, lack of housing)
- Complex/chronic health issues

Provider barriers

- Traditional clinic-based services
- SUD Treatment Model
- Contacting and connecting with people who lack housing

County Characteristics

- Wildfires
- Lack of housing
- Lack of providers
- Rural and low-income
- ACE Scores



What is not working?

- The current system <u>is</u> working well for clients that are motivated and high functioning enough to engage in treatment.
- The current system <u>is not</u> working well for individuals that are not able to engage in ongoing outpatient mental health services.



What is the solution? Addressing barriers to engagement!

- 1 Peer Support Counselor
- 2 FT and 2 PT Peer Support Specialists

To Whom It May Concern:

Community Whole Health Alliance (CWHA) supports the Resiliency Empowerment Support Team (REST) at Everhart Village proposal for the Mental Health Services Act Innovation Project for Butte County.

CWHA is a newly incorporated nonprofit organization funded through a DHCS grant that grew from grassroots advocacy among consumers of mental health in Butte County. We have given substantial input into the project since 2019 and agreed with many changes and compromises that were made to enhance the peer support elements of the Innovation Project Plan.

The proposal will fill gaps in services by providing outreach to the unsheltered homeless people with mental health challenges in our community, which has had an affordable housing crisis for the past four years. Butte County had a housing shortage even prior to the Camp Fire, Bear Fire, and Dixie Fire, which devastated the local access to housing and displaced thousands. The location of Everhart Village is adjacent to behavioral health, substance use, and crisis services, while within a 5-minute walk of primary care services and a peer support recovery & wellness center.

Some of the essential services on-site are a computer lab and a community building where residents can seek support from their fellows as they all adapt to the great changes resulting from having stable shelter following a period of unsheltered homelessness or a high risk of losing their housing. Having access to the Internet and computers is essential in today's world, while knowing and interacting with people who are undergoing similar transitions can be a tremendous source of support.

The REST project allows for long-term engagement with unsheltered community members and access to peer support in a new and exciting way. CWHA is supportive of this initiative that could allow access to mobile peer support and services without law enforcement involvement or insurance barriers. This is extremely important in the City of Chico, which has a negative history of interactions with the unsheltered population.

We have been especially impressed by the grassroots efforts to build this proposal to focus on voluntary services, whether they result in service connection or not, to attempt to provide care to an underserved population. Furthermore, the proposal has taken into account and adopted the vast majority of stakeholder recommendations in bringing this proposal to its fruition, demonstrating the commitment to be responsive to our community.

This is the right program for Butte County.

What is the problem you are trying to solve and what is not working?

Problem: Despite mental health and wellness needs among unhoused community members in Berkeley, participation in services remains low.

What isn't working? Outreach teams have been funded in the City to try and connect unhoused individuals to mental health services, however there remains a large set of individuals who indicate that they are uninterested in services despite appearing to have mental health conditions.



How will the INN Project address this problem?

Mobile Wellness Center: Delivering Customizable, Onsite Services to Unhoused Community Members

Encampment-based, with ability to provide onsite services to multiple encampments.

Customizable menu of services, to focus on four primary service areas: food/hygiene, benefits & service navigation, wellness, and community enrichment.

Peer-led service delivery team, including wellness ambassadors recruited directly from the encampment community.


